NO HOMESTEAD FOR ALIEN ENEMY

New Order Does Not Bar Any Alien Naturalized Who is in C.E.F.

Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—An order in Council has been passed providing that no application for an entry for a homestead in Western Canada shall be granted unless the applicant was a British subject at the commencement of the war and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of one of the allled or neutral countries. This new regulation will not apply to any alien-born person maturalized since the commencement of the war who is a member of the Canadian Expeditionary Porces, or who has been honorably discharged from the Canadian army.

CONSURIET NEWFOUNDLANDERS?

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 18.—Selective conscription may be adopted in Newfoundland as in Canara, in order to maintain the strength of the colony's overseas forces, in the epidion of tovernment officials here. It was stated to day that the stream of reinforcements which has sent six thousand men from the Island to the firing line in the past three years has virtually dried up, notwithstanding a viporous recruiting extingation, and the colonial Government has been advised that the Newfoundland Rentment, which has figured conspicuously in official statements, both at Gaillpoil and on the Western front, must soon be withdrawn unless more men are forthcoming.

PARIS TEACHER ARRESTED.

Paris, Nov. 18—Helens Brion, thirty-five years old, a teacher in an infant school, has been arrested charged with carrying on anti-millitary propaganda. The Matin says that others, teachers for the most part, are implicated in the affair. One of her acquaintances was Miguel Almereyda, the editor of The Bonnet Rouge, who died in prison after having been arrested on the charge of sedition. She went to London in December, 1913, and took part in a suffragette window smashing demonstration there.

CANADIANS DECORATED.

London, Nov. 18.—Capt. Malcolm McGregor and Lleut, Norman Keys received the Military Cross at Buckingham Palace. The King also received Lord Northeline.
