U.S. FOOD ADMINISTRATION IS PERMITTING EXPORT UNDER LICENSE.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, Dec. 14. -- The Food Controller's Office announced to-day

that, under agreement with United States Food Administration, the latter will now permit cotton-

seed oil and its products to be exported under license to Canada for Canadian consumption. Re-export from Canada will not be permitted. As Canada raises sufficient hogs for home requirements, the United States Food Administration will not grant licenses for an indefirite

Regular licenses will be required on all shipments as heretofore, but no license will be issued without the approval of the L'ood Controller of Canada.
