Consul - General of Greece From Montreal Meets Feilow-countrymen Here

The Greeks in Toronto are, they claim, misludged and sometimes illtreated. many Canadians apparently believing them to be pro-German. A desire for a better relationship between them and the Canadians between them and the Canadians whose native land they have adopt-ed brought Mr. J. C. ians, The question to be answered, he said, was as to whether they were enemies or friends of this country. The local authorities think they are enemies and treat them accordingly. They think it is a disgrace and in-justice to be classed as Turks by their adopted country.
