

HAS PROVED HE WAS FOR THE ALLIES

L. W. Ripton, a Year Interned as Suspected Spy, Has Fallen in Fight

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)
Kingston, April 14. — Word reached Kingston to-day that Leonard W. Ripton, who spent a year in Fort Henry internment camp here as a suspected German spy, had been killed in action on April 7, while fighting with the American artillery. Ripton was with the 8th C. M. R. at Barrielfield camp in the summer of 1915. He was eventually released from Fort Henry on proving that he was an American citizen. Ripton declared he would some day prove that he was for the allies. His parents reside at Johnstown, N.Y.

ASHAMED OF FREDERICK.

German Emperor's Statue in Washington is Packed Away.

Washington, April 14. — The bronze statue of Frederick the Great, which has ornamented the western facade of the War College Building on the banks of the Potomac here, was removed in sections yesterday and packed away for safe keeping.

It is understood the statue was removed at the instance of President Wilson, who has taken notice of bitter criticisms expressed in Congress and elsewhere over permitting the statue to remain. The statue, which is of heroic size, was a personal gift of the German Emperor William II. to the American nation during President Roosevelt's Administration.
