"They are Bulgarians and Austrians. I am filling their places with returned soldiers. We don't consider the former members of the union," said Mr. R. G. Long last night in reply to a request for information regarding a strike among the employees in his factory. Mr. Long took the view that there was no strike, since the men did not belong to a union.

"Sixty moccasin workers who were employed by the Long Company have gone strike for higher on wages. They have had no increase since the outbreak of the war, and it is likely that if the matter is not adjusted by Monday the workers will come out in sympathy," said Mr. Walter Brown, agent of the Boot and Shoe Workers' Union, of which the strikers membérs.
