

# CATTLE DRIVER KILLED BY TRAIN

## John Draidge of Moffat, Ont., Dies of Injuries in West- ern Hospital

John Draidge, aged 50 years of Moffat, Ont., a cattle driver, was run over by a passenger train at the West Toronto station yesterday evening and so badly injured that he died last night in the Western Hospital. John Allison of Galt, was driving cattle over the tracks with Draidge, when the accident happened. He was also struck by the train, but was thrown clear of the rails and escaped injury.

Both men were handling ten head of cattle and in their efforts to drive the cattle over the crossing in safety before the arrival of the fast approaching passenger train were themselves struck. The engineer and several cars passed over the body of Draidge.

His left leg was amputated below the knee, his skull fractured and his face badly lacerated.

Little hope for his recovery was held out from the time he was admitted to the Western Hospital. He was unconscious and was suffering from loss of blood in addition to other injuries. The body will be taken to the Morgue, and a coroner's inquest held.

## WANT UNITED ACTION ON ALIEN QUESTION

### BRITISH IMPERIAL ASSOCIATION APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO DEAL WITH PROBLEM.

The British Imperial Association of Earlscourt last night, at the Earlscourt School, appointed a committee to take up the alien enemy question and invite other associations to deal with the same matter so that united action might be taken along similar lines.
