

GREAT STRIDES IN CITY REGISTRATION

Prediction Is That To-day Will
See Nearly 400,000 on
the Roll.

The Toronto Registration Board and its army of deputies to-day made another great stride toward the completion of its task of registering all the residents of this city above the age of 16 years. More than 5,000 names were added to the total before noon, but the rush does not commence until the afternoon and reach its flood in the evening, when all the schools of the city are thrown open for registration. Yesterday's total was 75,000 and those in charge of the work predict the closing of the booths to-night will see the aggregate close of 400,000.

Foreigners Follow Advice.

Foreigners and Canadians of foreign birth have followed Chairman Steele's advice to "register early." Booths along Queen street, Richmond street and in other sections where "new" Canadians are thickly settled are crowded from early morning until late at night.

Registration headquarters to-day announced that in places where there are several banks in the same district registration is carried on at only one. "Look for the placard" is the advice of the registrars to the public.

J. M. Godfrey, superintendant of Registration for Central Ontario, to-day issued another appeal to the citizens to go to the schools in the evening to register.

Lieutenant-Governor Registers.

The visit of Lieutenant-Governor Sir John Hendrie, Lady Hendrie, and Miss Enid Hendrie to the Centre Toronto registration booth was snapped by motion-picture operators, and the film will be shown during the remainder of the week at local picture theatres. The party included Ven. Archdeacon H. J. Cody, Minister of Education.

From all parts of Central Ontario come reports of the same wonderful co-operation that is getting such good results in Toronto.

Some misunderstanding exists, headquarters to-day announced, regarding the registration of invalids and those who for reasons other than sickness cannot go to the booths. Sick people may register after their recovery or now. For cases of illness and for others where people are confined to their homes the local board has provided deputies, who will visit the residences. This plan, however, is the only method under the circumstances. Such people may not be registered by other members of the family or by friends.
