

NO CHOICE FOR THIS AUSTRIAN, IS INTERNED

Won Appeal For Bail on Charge, But Is At Once Interned

From jail to the internment camp is the experience of Harry Hawrelesh, an Austrian miner, who has been causing some activity at the Mounted Police barracks lately.

The other evening Hawrelesh was picked up by the police in a pool room in Staffordville. He was unable to produce his parole certificate and on his being brought before Superintendent Pennefather he was sent to jail for three months without the option of a fine. Supt. Pennefather explained at the time that many alien enemy citizens have been growing altogether too indifferent to the laws of the land, and in some cases they have been abusing themselves overmuch. In the case of Hawrelesh, while he was being brought to the barracks after his arrest he jumped from the police automobile and quite a chase ensued before he was brought back, a few shots being fired by the pursuers.

The Appeal.

Yesterday morning R. A. Smith, acting for Hawrelesh, appeared before Judge Jackson, making application to appeal the case and also applying for bail. Leave to appeal was granted, but when two of Hawrelesh's friends were produced to go bail for him Supt. Pennefather objected on the ground that they, too, were prisoners of war on parole. The bail was not granted, but the third act of the drama was staged this morning when Mr. Smith again made application for bail. This time Matt Logan and Chas. Peacock put up the necessary bail, and they were accepted as bondsmen, but on the release of Hawrelesh under bail, the Mounted Police immediately picked him up. His parole was immediately cancelled, and he is starting tonight on his way to the internment camp.

Hawrelesh was formerly a soldier in the Austrian army. It is stated that his interpreter told him after the court proceedings this morning that men were shot back in Austria for less opposition to the law.

An Example.

Supt. Pennefather is determined that the laws affecting alien enemies shall not be treated lightly as they have been in the past.

Henceforth, Austrians failing to report have been dealt with leniently, a small fine being imposed. The Hawrelesh case however is a warning to his friends on parole to be rather more circumspect in future.
