

# WHY IS PYSANUK IN JAIL?

**Crown Will Ask Brantford Police—  
Man in Custody Wants  
Release.**

Why is Alex. Pysanuk in jail in Brantford? His case, called at Osgoode Hall to-day, went over for a week, to let the crown produce particulars.

J. G. O'Donoghue, acting for Pysanuk, appeared before Sir William Mulock on a writ of habeas corpus.

Pysanuk was born in Gallioia, but, according to his lawyer, his sympathies were Russian.

Pysanuk was interned early in the war, but was released on parole. He was rearrested a month ago, the chief of police of Brantford saying that he was a leader of the Socialist element, and had been present at a meeting where the King and the R. C. clergy were cursed. He kept a bookstore, and one book, it was said, was entitled "Shoot to Kill."

It was also alleged that Pysanuk held dances at all hours of the night.

The chief justice laid it down as a British principle that a man would be protected by the law if he complied with the law.

When the motion was enlarged for a week, Mr. O'Donoghue said, it wasn't right to keep his client in jail during the adjournment.

The chief justice assented, but added that conditions were not normal, and made no interim order.
