Adopts Resolution,

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The feeling of the meeting on the alien question was expressed in the unanimous adoption of the following resolution, which was presented to the meeting by the Executive Committee:

"Be it resolved, that all persons who, on account of their nationality, are not hable for service under the Military Service. Act shall pay a percentage of their wages into the account of the Minister of Finance, and that employers shall be responsible for the collection of the tax; that anxone having dependents of whom he is the sole support in Canada be relieved proportionately.

"Further, that we view with alarm the coming effect of all adiens on the labor market, and we resolve that the Dominion Labor Department devise measures to protect all fartish labor against all aliens, and that a representative from this association he invited to attend proposed conferences to present the views of these not connected with labor ormanizations."
