2. No enemy alien a radius of five miles from his or her permanent abode without such passport from the proper authorities.

3. That a custodian be appointed at once for enemy allen property, with similar powers as are invested in custodians in Great Britain, the United States and Australia.

The present law governing the registration of enemy aliens shall be strictly enforced.

Should Pay More Taxes.

5. The Dominion Income Tax Law shall be so amended as to reduce the exemption on married enemy aliens

such allied aliens be forthwith given the option of enlisting voluntarily in the Canadian forces or being deported to the country of their origin, as is being done by the Government of the United States, under the Alien Slacker Bill just passed by an overwhelming majority in the house of representatives at Washington. In presenting the report of the special committee appointed to consider the alien question, Comrade Dawson, secretary of the committee, pointed out that the committee had considered many resolutions on the question and that the series of resolutions brought forward for the consideration of the convention embodied most of the requests of the various branches.

"Doesn't Go Far Enough."

Comrade G. F. Murrell, secretary of the Central Toronto branch of the G. W. V. A., expressed the opinion that the report of the special committee did not go far enough in restricting the enemy alien in his work at munition plants.

"No enemy alien," he said, "should be permitted to work on the manufacture of munitions in time of war."

He urged that a clause to this effect be inserted in the report before it was finally passed.

Government Did Nothing

"Government Did Nothing."
Comrade Peart, of Hamilton, seemed quite satisfied with the report. "The G.W.V.A.," he declared, "already have sent delegates to the Government and they have done nothing in the matter. To my mind, the tax clause is the finest thing that has been suggested so far, I am much pleased altogether with the report and hope that it will stop further useless discussion on the subject."
