This motion, moved by Col. Hendrie, of Montreal, and seconded by Comrade Dyson, of Calgary, was passed by unanimous vote at the convention this morning.

Major MacPherson, of Ottawa, introduced another motion to the effect that:

"The Dominion executive be in-

structed to make a thorough investigation of the rioting and that the ringleaders be punished."

Comrade MacPherson declared he would not deal with the affair in such moderate terms as expressed in

the resolution. "It was a disgrace," he declared. "I was in one of the places raided. They simply smashed everything in the place. Not content with that they broke into the till."

Comrade McCloud said that in view of the peculiar situation of allied and enemy aliens in Toronto, there was at least cause for a protest by returned soldiers. He said that aliens could put things over that an ordin-

ary "Tommy" could not. The remainder of the comrade's speech was hooted down and by special request of the president not given publicity.

Frank Giolma, M.L.A., of Victoria, B. C., said:
"No one wants violation of the law and disorder. However, if the cause is removed there will be no trouble. Everybody regrets the occurence. I do not like it, but the cause should be removed. The returned soldiers are decent people, but is just shows what they will do when incited.
"The same thing will, happen when

all the soldiers come back. The trouble could be removed by licensing

the restaurants."

James Robinson, of Vancouver, said: "The government had been petitioned to deal with these foreigners. If the matter is not dealt with in some manner the situation will become worse with the return of more men from the front daily and finding so many bussinesses monopolized by foreigners. Then there will be more trouble."

"Although your committees have been unable to offer us proportionate voting at the present convention, as requested in our resolution before retiring, the delegates from Winnipeg and Ottawa, earnestly desiring to help the cause of the returned men and the association at large, will gladly return and participate in the deliberations of the present convention provided the following vital questions shall not be decided upon by the present convention.

the following vital questions shall not be decided upon by the present convention, which is in our opinion not properly representative to the members of the G.W.V.A.:

"1—No resolution of political nature to be introduced by this convention.

"No policy of open-door for membership be adopted by this convention.

"3—No resolution to compel local branches to become members of the pro-

"3—No resolution to compel local branches to become members of the procial association to be considered at this convention.

"4—That a committee be selected containing one member from each province in the Dominion to thoroughly investigate government and civic grants of money in all provinces and the expenditure of such grants as have been made, and to advise

grants as have been made, and to advise the Dominion executive as to the advisability of such grants being accepted in the future. The expense of such investigation to be borne by the Dominion body."
