Hamilton, Monday, Aug. 12.

Mrs. Green, 187 James street south, was notified to-day that her son, Flight-Lieut. Merle L. Green, had been killed in action. He was 26 years of age, and in the first year of the war he was attached to an infantry division as a Lieutenant. Later he joined the Royal Flying Corps, training at Toronto University, Long Branch, Deseronto and Camp Borden. After completing his training in England he was placed in charge of the latest model and highest power fighting machine.

Word was also received that Pte. James Gemmell, 10 Fullerton avenue, who was a member of the First Contingent, had been killed in action.

Hamilton Police Union.

The members of the Hamilton Police Force decided this afternoon to form a union. They held a meeting and reached a decision to apply to the Dominion Trades Congress for a charter. They were addressed by W. R. Rollo, Secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, and by James Riley, representative of the Machinists.

John Doolittle, driver of a coal motor truck, who resides at 537 John street north, ran over and killed his five-year-old son at noon to-day. The little chap had run out to meet his father, who did not see him, and was horrified when he stepped down from the truck to find the mangled remains of his little son under the truck.

Must Dismiss Aliens.

H. Nazarene, 417 Sherman avenue, who keeps a restaurant, was ordered by the Police Commissioners to dismiss enemy aliens in his employ. Mayor Booker said that any restaurant keeper who employed enemy aliens should not have a license. The Commissioners recommended that the Board of Control pay \$200, the amount of the judgment given against Sergt. May for searching a citizen on the suspicion that he was carrying liquor.
