

SON OF RUSSIA DIES FOR CANADA

Lithuanian Native, Who En-
listed With Peel County
Unit, Falls in Battle

NUMBERS GROWING LESS

**Young Lad on Third Birthday
Gets News of Father's
Death**

Pte. Charles Briglatis, son of Mr. William Briglatis, 155 Lappin avenue, a **Lithuanian**, has been killed in action. Pte. Briglatis enlisted in a Peel county battalion when he was seventeen years of age. Prior to enlistment he was an employee of the Standard Sanitary Company. He was a member of St. Anthony's Church.

Pte. E. Warner, whose wife resides at 173 Sackville street, has died in France from gunshot wounds. Pte. Warner was 41 years of age when he enlisted in the 201st Battalion. He went to France last February.

Pte. Samuel Black, who has been killed in action, is survived by a widow and one child, who reside at 685 Ossington avenue. He went overseas with the 208th Battalion, enlisting in Newmarket.

C. M. R. Man Killed.

Pte. William A. Brady, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Brady, 26 Fermanagh avenue, is reported to have died from gunshot wounds. Pte. Brady was an employee of the T. Eaton Company, who went overseas in October, 1917, with a draft from the Canadian Mounted Rifles.

Pte. Ernest Dunford, whose parents reside at 40 Armstrong avenue, has been killed in action. The casualty came to his home on the eve of his twentieth birthday.

Major Blair M. Clerk of Woodlawn avenue, is mentioned in yesterday's casualty lists. It is the sixth time he has been wounded. Major Clerk went overseas with the 74th Battalion, and won his promotion on the field, as well as the Military Cross.

Pte. J. A. White of 39 Eversfield avenue, who was wounded during March, is reported yesterday to have been killed. His brother went overseas in the same Highland battalion, and his father enlisted with the Bantams.

A Sad Third Birthday.

Pte. Arthur Day of 127 Spruce street was yesterday reported killed in action. The message came to his home on the birthday of his three-year-old son. Pte. Day had twice been wounded. He was an employee of the Gutta Percha Rubber Company prior to enlistment.

Lieut. Edward A. Davidson of 28 Fermanagh avenue was killed by a sniper as he was leading his men over the trenches to an attack. Pte. Davidson enlisted in South Africa, where, prior to the war, he was a member of the South African Mounted Police.

Sergt. Enright of 496 Clinton street has been killed in action. He had recently returned to the trenches after recovering from wounds received on September 13. He had been awarded the Military Medal and later the Distinguished Conduct Medal for capturing a German machine gun and killing two of its men.
