The second was Herman Mitz, a re-servist of the German Landsturn, and the third is Henry Osthof, a Hanover merchant, and formerly a Prussian artilleryman. Each was fined \$50 and costs for not having the necessary registration papers, and an additional \$200 and costs Alien Enemy Act. The cases were tried at Wo for the
