London, Dec. 6.—In the detai the detailed by Premier Lloyd George yesterday, ealing for the trial and punishment of the men responsible for the war, however high their place, he pledg-ed the entire influence of the Brit-ish Government at the Peace Con-ference to see that justice was dear ish Government at the Peace Con-ference to see that justice was done. In declaring for the expulsion and exclusion of all enemy allens from British soil, the Premier pointed out that a considerable proportion of enemy residents in the United King-dom during the war had abused British hospitality and thus had for-feited their claims to remain. In his statement the Premier, after paying a warm tribute to the soldiers and sailors of the Empire, sold:

Mast Prosecute Kaiser.

Must Prosecute Kaiser. "The Kaiser must be prosecuted. The war was a crime. Who doubts that? It was a frightful, terrible erime. It was a crime in the way in which it was planned and in the deliberate wantonness with which it was provoked. It was also a crime in the invasion of a helpiess little State and in the wicked and most brutal treatment of that little State. Remember the treaty of neutrality, the sorap of paper! "Surely the war was a crime. The fact that all these iniquitous things were done in the name of war and under the Imperial edict of an autocrat does not change their nature. The war was a hideous, abominable crime, a crime which has sent millions of the best young men of Europe to death and mutil-ation and has plunged myriads of homes into desolation. Panish Those Responsible. "Is no one responsible? Is no one to be called to account? Is there to be no purishment? Surely that is neither God's justice nor man's. The men responsible for this outrage on the human race must not be let of because their heads were crowned when they per-petrated the deed. "After what has happened in the last four or five years it is impossible to entertain in our midst a popula-tion of which a considerable portion abused our hospitality. This has been demonstrated by evidence im-possible to ignore. They spied and plotted and assisted Germany in forming plans for the destruction of a country which offered them hospi-tality. They hus have forfeited any claim to remain.

Germany Must Suffer.

"Further, it would lead to inevit-able irritation and disturbance if Germans who have been fighting us for four years came here to take the bread out of the mouths of the men whom they for four years four that it is impossible to have free intercourse between all nations, I hold we are up against the events

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of the last four years, for which Germany alone is responsible, and she must abide the consequences. All the European allies have accept-ed the principle that the Central powers must pay the cost of the war up to the limit of their capacity. The allies propose to appoint a com-mittee of experis to examine the best method of exacting the in-demnity." In one passage of his program, that dealing with measures for an increase of British output, Mr. Lloyd George says: "There is one condition for the success of all efforts to increase the output of this country, namely, con-fidence. Bolshevism is the poison of production. Ruesia proves that. Russia will not begin the building up of a productive system until Bolshevism has worked itself out." Mr. Lloyd George in his statement describes the extensive provisions the Government proposes for dis-charging its obligations to the gal-describes the extensive provisions the Government proposes for dis-charsing its obligations to the gal-lant soldiers and sailors—alike to the failen, the cripoled and others. He dealt also with the housing and other problems connected with post-war reconstruction and the develop-ment of electrical power. Will Have Protection.

Will Have Protection. In referring to need for confi-dence in industrial enterprise, he said: "All classes must give con-fldence to those who have brains, those who have capital to those with hearts and hands to work. I say to Labor: You shall have fus-tice. You shall have fair treatment and a fair share of the amenities of life. You shall have fair treatment life. Your children shall have equal onnortunities with the child-ren of the rich. To Capital I say: You shall not be plundered and pen-alized. Do your duty by those who work for you, and your future is free for all the enterprise of audacity you can give us. But there must be equal justice, and Labor must have have its just reward."
