POLES FROM CANADA TO JOIN PADEREWSKI

TRANSPORT LEVIATHAN TO CARRY 600 SOLDIERS ON WAY TO POLAND.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

New York, Jan. 23. — Departure of the American transport Leviathan, which had been scheduled to sall to-day, was postponed until 11 o'clock to-morrow morning, on account of the heavy fog. The ship had been laid up here several weeks because of engine trouble.

There are 60 first-class passengers booked and 883 in the steerage. Included in the latter class are 600 Poles recruited in Canada, who are bound for Poland to Join Paderewski's army.

William G. Sharp, Ambassador to France, and his son, William G. Sharp, jun., are on the Leviathan bound for Paris,

A majority of the first cabin passengers are public officials and army officers.
