FOREIGNERS LEAVING WITH THEIR SAVINGS

ARE TAKING LARGE AMOUNTS
OF MONEY WITH THEM TO
THE ATLANTIC PORTS

Welland, Feb. 8 .-- An extensive exodus of foreigners is taking place from this district, and the general feeling is that this movement will dethe European situation Bankers here state that an unusually large number of foreignhave closed their accounts which range from \$1,500 to \$10,000. Although the transportation to Europe still presents difficulties, these foreigners are carrying their money to Montreat, Halifax and New York, especially the latter port, and at these places are awaiting the first opportunity to sail for their native In addition to numerous Englishmen, this unparalleled exodus includes French, Italians, Spaniards, Russians, Roumanians, Hungarians and Austrians. A strong sentiment prevails that an embargo should be placed upon the exportation of the large amount of wealth accumulated during war years by these foreigners. bank managers and business men

of wealth accumulated during war years by these foreigners. Some bank managers and business men urge that the emigration of these men should be prohibited for perfect yearing from six months to four years. This prohibition, of course; refers only to allens of enemy birth and perhaps to Russians. A large proportion of this money will be spent for reconstruction purposes in enemy countries, and the managers of Welland's banks speak strongly on the subject.
