of representative elements of Hamliton's life should be created to pass on the desirability of the continued residence of the **enemy aliens** in question in Canada.

It was pointed out to them by the Acting Promier that to deport these enemy allens was impossible at present because of the lack of ocean tonage, and because they could not be passed to their respective countries until a policy with regard to them is formulated by the Peace Conference. The Government, however, could intern all those whom special tribunals to be appointed decided were undesirable or dangerous, with a view to their subsequent deportation.

Among the Ministers present were Sir Thomas White, Hon. Arthur Meighen, Hon. J. A. Calder, Senator Robertson, Hon. J. D. Reid and Hon. A. K. Maclean.
