"Conscientious objectors," he "Conscientious objectors," he continued, "who say that they can-not take part in the fighting of the country they live in, and who could not help behind the lines in Red Cross and other work, should not have a voice in the Government of the country for which their con-science would not let them fight.

"Those who are shirkers from the "Those who are shirkers from the Millitary Service Act, defauiters, de-serters, and any man or woman who assisted in any manner to hin-der the proper course of the M.S. A., should be struck from the vor-ors' list forever."

Dr. James L. Hughes, President of the association, presided at the meeting, and introduced the speaker. Resolutions were passed which authorized the acceptance of sev-eral relics from the T. Eaton Com-pany, and a diary of the life of and a diary of the lif Osler from his son, Sir of
