ALIEN BILL DROPS: IT "WENT TOO FAR"

Senator Bradbury Withdraws Measure Disfranchising Foreign Settlers

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, March 26.—In the Senate to-day Benator Bradbury's bill, which aimed at the distranchisement of Germans, Austrians and Russians who have settled in Canada within the last twenty years, and which would withhold naturalization from the same persons coming to Canada from new on until they had lived in the country for ten years, was withdrawn.

Senators Dandurand, Turriff. Belque, Choquette Boyer all Beique, Choquette and Boyer all spoke in opposition to the measure as going too far, while Sir James Lougheed, who concluded the depate, thought that possibly the measures contemplated by the bill were impracticable were impracticable, as it would be almost impossible, in view of the territorial and political changes in Europe, to differentiate between aliens. Sir James also thought that, in view of the proposed Government franchise and immigration measures, the bill was somewhat premature, and he suggested that, having drawn the attention of the matter to the House, Senator Bradbury withdraw the bill until the Government's proposals were made known.

German Minister Makes Loud-sounding Promise

Berlin, March 26.—"I take a most solemn oath that the Government will not surrender to the enemy one inch of German territory, either east or west," said Dr. Schiffer, Minlater of Finance in the new Cabinet, in addressing a great crowd in front of the Chancellor's Palace on Sunday, according to The Tages Zeltung.
