Here Is Resolution

Following is the text of the alien resolution:

"Whereas during the past five years the Dominion of Canada, particularly the Western Provinces, has

been brought face to face with the problem of deaing with undesirable ailens of all classes who have been admited into this country under past

"Whereas it has been demonstrated conclusively that unrestricted immigration, instead of being of benefit, has proved a serious menace to this country; and "Whereas it has further been

demonstrated that there are in Canada at the present time thousands of undesirable aliens of enemy origin to whom can be traced most of the unrest at present existing in this country, and whose presence is an insult to the men who have fought in defense of the Empire, who are obliged

to come into daily contact with them; and "Whereas there are also very large numbers of aliens in Canada who have become good Canadian citizens, and others who are anxious to become true British subjects against whom it would be unfair to discriminate; and "Whereas this association has

noted with pleasure the action of the C.P.R. in dismissing all aliens employed on road work on the Brandon division, thereby demonstrating that

"Third—That a close censorship on all immigration be kept and that no further concessions be made to various religious sects, etc., and further that all immigrants, before being admitted to Canada, be obliged to sign the obligation as described above, and that during the period between the entry of said immigrants and the time of their becoming naturalized they should be kept under observation, and if, in the opinion of the above constituted court, they fail to conform to the laws governing all citizens of Canada, they shall be
