

REDS ADMIT DESIGNS ON LOYAL LABOR

Toronto Police Report Confession By 2 Men and Woman to Be Deported

PREACH BOLSHEVISM

TORONTO, May 3—Two Germans and a Russian, captured in a round-up of Bolshevist agitators, have admitted, Toronto police say, that they were among the originators of the "One Big Union" movement, by which it was hoped to inveigle the legitimate Canadian labor organizations into an adoption of the tenets of Lenine and Trotzky.

Nation-Wide Conspiracy

In the arrest of Liel Samsonavitch, alias Samson, Black and Charles Arthur Ewart, alias Arthur Ewit, Lita Zaborowski, alias Mrs. Ewit, immigration officials assert they have exposed the ramifications of a nation-wide conspiracy on the part of seditious organizations, whose membership is composed for the greater part of enemy aliens, to foment a labor upheaval, which would result in the overthrow of the entire existing social order.

The two men and the woman will be deported immediately.

Samsonavitch was a student of Columbia university, who was expelled for seditious utterances. He failed in an attempt to enter Toronto university after coming to Canada.

Ewart is a native German, according to his papers, who came to Canada in 1914. The woman, Zaborowski is also a German, masqueraded as Ewart's wife.

Literature which was seized showed Bolshevik propaganda has penetrated the Toronto branches of the Communist party, the international Workers, the General Workers' union, and the Revolutionary and Anarchistic parties. The names and addresses of the leaders of the movements are given. They are Russians, Germans and Jews with a sprinkling of Canadians and English. Among the leaders are an Irishman, a Finnlander, two Dutchmen and two Englishmen.

The police say the prisoners, now "the game is up," have confessed everything and say that the greatest efforts were made to inveigle the legitimate labor party.
