Strikers Ready to Return to Work in Winnipeg if Assured All Strikers Will Get Jobs Back

This Is Report Now Current—Trades and Labor Council Endorses Movement for "Deportation of Undesirable Aliens"—City Policemen Willing to Sign Pledge Against Anti-Sympathetic Strikes

Winnipeg, June 9-The report is current that the strike leaders are prepared to order all the union men back to work if they could be assured all the strikers would get their jobs back. James Winning, president of the Trades Council, in a communication to the papers, states the council endorses the movement for the "deportation of all undesirable aliens." The city is calm and orderly today. More than 2,000 returned soldier constables are on duty. Mayor Gray, at a meeting of strikers and sympathizers, declared the city will not recede an inch from its determination to employ every legitimate means to maintain law and order, to feed all citizens and to combat the sympathetic strike of municipal employees. The mayor was heckled and told the strikers he would be "a spineless pup" if he acted otherwise. He held out no offer of compromise to those who quit their city jobs. Former employees must enter the city's service as newly hired workers. Winnipeg policemen formally notifled the city police commission at a meeting this morning that they were prepared to sign the new anti-sympathetis strike pledge provided the city withdraw its order not to take the strikers back. Endorse Russian Poles. Harold Riley, president of the Returned soldlers' Loyalist Association. announced that literature endorsing Russian Bolshevism principles and approving of the Soviet plan for Winnipeg, has been obtained by members of the association. Some literature was turned over to the local newspapers and carries the statement that it printed by the Western Labor News, the official publication of the strikers.
