The names Ruthen, and Ukrain, an as far as Canada is concerned, are apt to be suggestive of the West, but though these people are naturally agriculturists, many of them, finding themselves on infertile tracts of land in Manitoba, and in a climate of unaccustomed severity, drifted back to the cities and we have now about 6,000 Austrian Ruthenians and 3,000 Russian Ruthenians in Toronto, 2,000 of whom are women.
