NEVER WIN FIGHT

"Can't Beat the Law," Says Man Who Helped Bring About Troubles in Winnipeg— Internal Fight Starts.

WINNIPEG, July 8.—Leaders in the recent strike have not by any means given up the idea of aiming to secure the establishment of a six-hour day, according to J. L. McBride, business agent of the Electricians' Union and a member of the strike committee.

When asked how he would bring this about, he replied: "All the polls next November and in constitutional ways. When you start out to beat the law you simply can't do it, and some of us always knew it."

Strike leaders remanded to appear in the city police court Friday will be remanded again, according to T. J. Murray, counsel for the defense. Alderman John Queen and A. A. Heaps and R. E. Bray will not return from Toronto in time to appear, he stated.

Eight aliens to go before an immigration board, who may not be given a civil trial for participation in the riots, were named in the police court as follows: Antoni Czezanowski, Mike Antoohom, Mike Balacaiki, John Grabski, Adam Baryski, Kerick Condakonski, S. Jaswak and D. Muzak. If they are ordered deported no action will be taken on the rioting charges against them.

Must Show Its Loyalty.

The Winnipeg Evening Tribune prints the following:

"The Trades and Labor Council, central representatives body of organized labor in Winnipeg, will be called on to show its colors Tuesday night.

"On the hue of its colors will depend the life of the present organization.

"If it proves "red" the charter of the council will be revoked by the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and a new council will be formed.

"If they are shown to be those of "sane" labor, the body will be enlisted in the fight of the Dominion congress and the American Federation of Labor against the One Big Union and radicalism.

"Such is the statement of the men in charge of the fight of the big labor federations against the One Big Union and the radical element in labor.

"R. A. Rigg, general organizer for the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress in western Canada, will call upon the members of the Trades and Labor Council Tuesday night for a declaration of faith.

"If the radicals attempt to gain control of the meeting and swing the council behind a permanent radical policy, a stiff fight is expected to develop and if such a move is successful the permanent outlawing of the council from the ranks of organized labor is expected to follow."
