

ALIEN ORDERED OUT OF COUNTRY

Immigration Board Passes Sentence on Winnipeg Striker —Defence Gives Notice of Appeal.

WINNIPEG, July 19—Oscar Schoppelrei, one of the four aliens held by federal and immigration authorities for alleged seditious activities, was ordered to be deported by the immigration board of inquiry. Defence counsel gave notice of appeal to the minister of immigration. They also intimated that they would make application for a writ of certiorari in the court of King's Bench to quash the proceedings of the immigration board as irregular in which event application will be made for a writ of habeas corpus.

The decision of the board to deport Schoppelrei was based on two counts put forth by the crown counsel, that his original entry to Canada was obtained by misrepresentation of material facts, and that he refused to answer proper questions put by the chairman of the board and officers of the department.

Marcus Hyman, counsel for the defense, again appealed for the release of Schoppelrei under bail bonds pending the hearing of the defense appeal.

Mr. Andrews objected, saying: "I would urge that no bail should be granted. My instructions are that there is at the present time a pronounced revolutionary movement in the country. My experience is releasing the prisoners charged in the civil courts has been very unfortunate. I am instructed that they have gone through the country stirring up disorder and fomenting revolution. It would be very unfortunate if any of them was released at the present time."

Mr. Hyman protested against Mr. Andrews' remarks, declaring that his clients were only asking for the repeal of certain laws considered undesirable and soliciting funds for their defence.

Magistrate Noble, chairman, ruled that if it was considered improper to grant bail previously, the decision of the board should add weight to that attitude. He also refused to release the four aliens for the peace celebration today, as requested.

The only real progress in the examination of Solomon Almazoff was in his identification of literature and documents seized in his room. He denied membership in or knowledge of several organizations named by Mr. Andrews. He also denied parti-

icipation at meeting in the Liberty Temple. The accused, following the precedent established by the defence counsel previously, refused to answer certain questions. His case was put aside to permit the calling of other witnesses. The hearing is being continued.
