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GERMAN REPATRIATION IS WELL CARRIED OUT

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SWISS CONSUL-GENERAL BEARS
PLEASING TESTIMONY TO
HUMANE DEALING

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Montreal, July 28.—Pleasing testimony to the manner in which the repatriation of the German prisoners who left on the Sicilian last week for their home country, was carried out, was borne to-night by the Consul-General for Switzerland, Mr. Benj. R. Iseli, who having had charge of German interests as a neutral during the war from the

time that the American Consulate relinquished that duty, accompanied, the party as far as Father Point. "All the arrangements for repatriation were carried out in an orderly way, and everything went smoothly."

he stated.

"These arrangements were in the hands of Major-General Sir W. D. Otter, Director of Internment, assisted by Major Baillon, of Quebec," he added, "and I can only say that they in every way exhibited the humane spirit and consideration which the International Red Cross Society expects of beiligerent nations under such circumstances."

There were altogether \$55 prisoners sent back, of whom 22 were insane. The Swiss Consul-General
went down to Quebec last Tuesday
with one of the officers in charges:
as representing the interests of the
German Government. There were
557 prisoners from Amherst, N.S.
171 from Kapuskasing in Norther
Ontario, and 127 from Vernon, B.C.
who had joined the Ontario groupen route to Quebec.
