

ARRESTED AND INTERNEED IN KAPUSKASING

Count Maximillian Potocki, Travelling Incognito, Is Taken at Montreal

INCRIMINATING PAPERS

Documents from Spartacan Leader in Vienna Found on Count's Person

MONTREAL, Oct. 9.—Arrested at the Windsor hotel here, where they had registered as Mr. and Mrs. Dunn, on the eve of embarking on the Empress of France for Great Britain, Count Maximillian Egeon Potocki, was yesterday sent up to Kapuskasing interment camp, while a woman who was travelling with him was sent back to New York, whence the two had come to Montreal. Men on the staff of Captain J. Carter, registrar of alien enemies, found on the person of the count incriminating papers. They were from Dr. Frederick Adler, a Spartacan leader in Vienna, commenting on the "wonderful work" the count's mother was doing in Southern Europe, together with an eulogy of Rosa Luxembourg and Karl Liebknecht. Potocki was travelling incognito as James Dunn and his passport showed him to be a British subject and general manager of a big corporation. When arrested the couple had letters of credit on them for \$48,000 and cash \$3,673, besides jewelry worth \$5,000.

The arrest was made in virtue of the defence of the Canada act, 1914.
