ARE APPEALING IN VAIN

No Likelihood of Rescinding of Orders Until Formal Peace Signed

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ditawa, Dec. 16.—Anxious for Chi stmas cheer in the "good old way," numerous thirsty correspondents; are bombarding the Government with telegrams and letters. They are not representative of any one Province alone. They are from almost every part of the Dominion, and fall alike ask for relaxation of the war-time orders in Council prohibiting importation of intoxicating liquor.

Would Repeal All Orders.

Atting on a general principle, it twould repeal all the war-time orders in Council, not specially ordered in Council affecting importation and manufacture of intoxicating industry. But although rescinding of all war-time orders has met with support; there is no likelihood of any relaxation for Christmus. Formal speace, it is thought, is not now far distant, and with its coming war-time restrictions will cease.
