Dr. Steele in moving the resolution, which was finally carried, told the House that evidence was not lacking to show that the increase in the vast army of allens in this country was a menace to public welfare. He made an appeal to the Government to insitute a big campaign for Canadiantzation, which should be carried on with the cooperation of the provincial and municipal governments.
