
Canada's First World War Internment Operations, 1914-1920

This teaching unit seeks to raise awareness about a largely untold event in Canada's past that affected many communities including Ukrainians, Bulgarians, Croatians, Czechs, Germans, Hungarians, Italians, Jews, various people from the Ottoman Empire, Polish, Romanians, Russians, Serbians, Slovaks, Slovenes, among others of which most were Ukrainians and most were civilians.
