KINGSTON SYMPOSIUM Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund



m Welcome to the Kingston Symposium of the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund.

It is fitting that a gathering of scholars, artists, descendants, educators and community activists committed to recalling Canada's first national internment operations should be held in "the Limestone City." It was here, in 1978, that the Ukrainian Canadian community's campaign for acknowledgement and redress began, the result of a chance interview between Nykola Sakaliuk and a student exploring the historical geography of Kingston's small Ukrainian community. At the time I, like most other Canadians (even to this day!) had no knowledge of the unhappy experience of the Ukrainians and other Europeans who were branded as "enemy aliens" during the First World War and subjected to other state-sanctioned indignities. It was a story that had not been told.

What I was surprised to learn was that Mr Sakaliuk, a Ukrainian who left Bukovina in January 1912 to avoid conscription into the army of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, was arrested in Montreal in September 1914 not because of anything he had done but only because of where he had come from, who he was - an "Austrian." Transported to Fort Henry - Canada's first permanent internment camp - on 17 October 1914, 'Nick' lived in cell #19, spending a total of 31 months in captivity, including stints in Petawawa and Kapuskasing, all the while working for the profit of his captors. Later in life he said he bore no grudge against Canada "...my troubles here...were the fault of people who didn't know better," but he, like another survivor, Mary Manko Haskett, did want to make sure that what they endured was not forgotten. In 1994 Mary wrote:

Perhaps Canadian historians don't think that what happened to me, and the others, mattered. But it did. We were born here. We were Canadians. We had done nothing wrong. And those who, like my parents, had come from Ukraine to Canada came seeking freedom. They were invited here. They worked hard. They contributed to this country with their blood, sweat and tears. A lot of the latter....What was done to us was wrong. And, because no one bothered to remember or learn about the wrong that was done to us it was done to others again, and yet again. Maybe there's an even greater wrong in that.

Honouring the wishes of two Canadians who lent their support to a long but ultimately fruitful struggle for recognition, symbolic restitution and reconciliation, we are here assembled to consult, coordinate and craft initiatives intended to hallow the memory of all of the victims of Canada's first national internment operations, to commemorate their experiences nationally and to so educate the public about what happened. By taking these measures we can perhaps ensure that no other Canadian ethnic, religious or racial minority ever suffers as they did. We need to undo a crippling legacy.

This is an honourable undertaking and so, on behalf of the internees whom some of us were privileged to meet and whose stories will now, at least in part, be recovered, remembered and retold, I wish us all Godspeed – we uphold a just cause.
