Commission will be hosting the 18th annual Poker Float.

This popular event brings out inflatable craft of all sizes, shapes and decorations to bob along the Slocan River on the seven-kilometre float route from Perry Siding to the Winlaw Regional and Nature Park. Participants stop at five stations along the way, collecting a playing card at each. The last card is picked up at the park and the best hand wins the day. It's a day where the people and their crafts are all part of the show.

The float begins with registration at Perry Siding by the Threads Guild starting at 11 am. At the finish, prizes are awarded for best poker hand, best decorated float and best homemade hat as well as a variety of draw prizes.

A shuttle service runs from the finish to start area between 11 and 11:45 am, so folks will have their vehicles waiting

for them. It's strongly recommended that floaters take advantage of this service as after-float shuttles may not be available.

The float takes place along a relatively slow-moving portion of the river, but floaters should be aware there are always risks and to keep an eye open for submerged obstacles and fluctuating currents. Because of the higher than normal water along the river, the float may be quicker and the water cooler, so crafts that keep floaters out of the water might be preferable. Due to the unsettled weather, floaters may wish to phone 250-226-0008 to confirm the event is happening.

This year the fee for the event has been set at \$5 per person. That figure is reduced to the regular \$3 per person if a Slocan food bank donation item is brought along. This is a no-booze event and this policy as always will be strictly enforced.

The launch gets underway to the stirring melody of David Hogg's bagpipes. At the end of the ride, floaters will be greeted to the music of Holly and Jon Burden. Please arrange to have some money with you because members of the Valley Vendettas Roller Derby team will be hosting a concession at the park—and they mean business. There'll be free hot chocolate for the floaters should they need a shot of warmth and we'll set up the volleyball net for those wanting a friendly game.

A few float hints: There is a legal requirement that floaters must wear PFDs (personal flotation devices). Children 12 and under require adult accompaniment. Sunscreen and a hat are recommended. Please leave no garbage in the river.

tourist information booth would focus on local hot springs, campgrounds, ecotourism, trail development, historical and adventure tourism. A museum component would focus on local heritage, such as the history of the Ukrainian detention camps that were built in the community during the First World War. A plaque has been placed in Edgewood to honour these citizens, with the assistance of the UCCLA (Ukrainian Canadian Civil Liberties Association).

A showcase of green technology will feature alternative energy and building techniques, with seminars and workshops on solar energy, rainwater harvesting, low water gardening, and permaculture. Educational programs will focus on the preservation of native species and their importance

to community gardens.

The art gallery would offer a showcase for wood products, paintings, sculpture, pottery, fibre arts and stained glass. The planned centre would include a performance facility for theatre arts, plus studios for recording, photography, and animation. A youth activity centre will include children's programs to explore the ecosystem of the Arrow Lakes and Monashee Mountains.

At present Michiels says applications are going out to both federal and provincial funders. The goal is to have funding for some staff but there will definitely be a need for volunteers. An application for tenure on Crown land on Highway 6 has been made and is a key first step for the proposed project.

Daniel Hellyer, Helen Davis, Richard Allin and I had a worthwhile meeting with District Highways Manager Glenn Olleck and Program Engineer Ryan Oakley. We asked Glenn and Ryan to widen Highway 6's bike/pedestrian shoulders as much as possible during the \$4 million resurfacing project they have underway between New Denver and Hills. They agreed to do everything they could, although money for paved shoulder improvements is pretty limited. Glenn and Ryan are keeping us up to date on the work. Paving is scheduled to start in mid-August, after 'Weisbrich's blind spot' is fixed. They hope to finish everything by September 15, and give walkers and cyclists a little more room along the way.

Congratulations to Councillor Kevin Murphy for spearheading the school greenhouse project. Construction has now begun thanks to his efforts and the support of the school district staff. What are you thinking of doing next, Kevin?
