## ESCAPE OF PRISONERS WAS FACILITATED?

Senator Cloran's Charges Regarding Internment Camp at Amherst, N.S.

· (Special Despatch to The Globe.) Ottawa, March 2 .- In moving the Senate to-day for papers in connection with the escape last fall of German prisoners from the internment camp at Amherst, N.S., Senator Cloran declared that their escape was facilitated by the Commandant of the camp. "It is bad enough," clared the Senator, "to send our flesh and blood to fight the enemy in a foreign country without being trayed at home." He added that he had been given to understand that the officers who allowed the Germans to escape "were now in the penitentlary or in their graves."

It was not encouraging, he declared, to see British manufacturers sentenced for aiding the enemy and British labor erganizations refusing to make bullets, refusing to enlist and refusing to go to war. The Canadian Government should see to it that "there are no traitors in our midst and that the enemy is not replenished from our own internment

camps."
