FOURTEEN ALIEN SUSPECTS FROM FIRST CONTINGENT

DISEMBARKED AT HALIFAX, HANDCUFFED TO SOLDIERS, AND TAKEN TO CITADEL.

Halifax, Feb. 14.—There was quite

a stir at the steamship terminals today when the C.P.R. liner Missanable docked from Liverpool, and fourteen "alien suspects" from the first Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain disembarked under a strong guard, and were marched, each man handcunfed to a soldier, to the Citadel and

there imprisoned. Some of the suspects are admittedly of German and Austrian birth, while others of various foreign nationalities are under suspicion of disloyal tendencies. They all enlisted in Canada with various regiments of the first contingent, and were taken to England, but there were placed under detention.
